This year 76% of disadvantaged children passed the Phonics Screening Check, surpassing the 71% figure overall. Teachers adopt strategies used in planning, environment and teaching. Gap teaching in EYFS has led to 63.6% of disadvantaged children at a Good Level of Development, surpassing Local Authority figures by 12.7% and almost matching children who are not disadvantaged in the Local Authority, which was 66.1%
