Early Years Foundation Stage Policy

1 . Introduction

Early Years education is the foundation upon which young children build the rest of their schooling. It is a holistic education that encompasses all learning and development.

This is available to children who enter nursery in the term following their third birthday or school in the September of the academic year in which they will turn five years old. This is the final year of the EYFS and in the National Curriculum is referred to as the Reception Year.

This policy outlines the purpose, nature and management of the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) at Corrie Primary School.

The implementation of this policy is the responsibility of practitioners working in the EYFS setting, including both teaching and non-teaching adults.

In the policy the term 'setting' refers to the Early Years educational provision at Corrie Primary School.

In the policy the term 'practitioner' refers to the members of staff working with children within the setting.

2 . Aims of the Early Years Foundation Stage

In the EYFS setting at Corrie Primary School we believe that all children are entitled to the best possible start in their school life, both intellectually and emotionally, in order to enable them to develop their full potential.

We aim to support each child's welfare, learning and developmental needs by:

- Recognising that all children are unique and special.
- Understanding that children develop in individual ways and at varying rates - physically, cognitively, linguistically, socially and emotionally.
- Providing a safe, secure and caring environment where children feel happy and know that they are valued by the practitioners looking after them.
- Fostering and nurturing children's self-confidence and self-esteem through their developing awareness of their own identity and role within the community.
- Teaching them to express and communicate their needs and feelings in appropriate ways.
- Encouraging children's independence and decision-making, supporting them to learn through their mistakes.
- Developing children's understanding of social skills and the values and codes of behaviour required for people to work together harmoniously.
- Supporting children to develop care, respect and appreciation for others, including those with beliefs, cultures and opinions which differ to their own.
- Valuing the importance of play in children's learning and development.
- Providing learning experiences in play which reflect children's personal interests and areas of curiosity in order to encourage and develop their natural desire, interest, excitement and motivation to learn.
- Providing experiences which build on children's existing knowledge and understanding in order to challenge, stimulate and extend their learning and development.

- Providing effective learning opportunities in a range of environments, inside and outside.
- At Corrie we recognise, value and encourage parent's contribution to all aspects of their children's learning and development.

3. The Early Years Foundation Stage framework

Teaching in the EYFS setting at Corrie Primary School is delivered in accordance with the government's statutory document 'The Statutory Framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage' (March 2021). This document is a principled approach to Early Years education, bringing together children's welfare, learning and development requirements through four themes: 'A Unique Child', 'Positive Relationships', 'Enabling Environments with Teaching and Support from Adults' and 'Learning and Development.'

The curriculum is centred on **3 prime areas** of learning:

1. Communication and Language.
2. Physical Development
3. Personal, Social and Emotional Development

Practitioners must also provide activities in **four specific areas** of learning which strengthen the prime areas.

These are:

1. Literacy
2. Mathematics
3. Understanding the World
4. Expressive Arts and Design

All areas of learning and development are important and inter-connected.

Educational programmes which practitioners deliver in the setting must involve activities and experiences from one of these seven areas.

These areas of learning and development address children's physical, cognitive, linguistic, social and emotional development. No one aspect of development stands in isolation from the others as all areas of learning and development are closely interlinked. This ensures the delivery of a holistic, child-centred curriculum which allows children to make lots of links between what they are learning. All areas of learning and development are given equal weighting and value.

At Corrie Primary School, we believe that Early Years education is important in its own right and should not be viewed simply as preparation for the next stage of children's education. We believe that the EYFS framework allows a natural progression into the National Curriculum at the beginning of Year 1.

4 . Active Learning through Play

At Corrie Primary School we recognise that young children learn best when they are active.

We understand that active learning involves other people, objects, ideas and events that engage and involve children for sustained periods. Therefore, we believe that Early Years education should be as practical as possible and our EYFS setting has an ethos of learning through play.

We recognise the importance of children's play. It is an essential and rich part of their learning process, supporting them in all areas of development. Play is a powerful motivator encouraging children to be creative and to develop their ideas, understanding and language. Play is also flexible

and able to suit the preferred learning style of the child. It can provide multiple ways for children to learn a variety of different skills and concepts.

In the EYFS setting at Corrie Primary School practitioners provide both structured and unstructured play opportunities inside and outside. These activities are designed to engage children in practical, first-hand experiences which will support children to discover, explore, investigate, develop their personal interests and areas of curiosity, and help to make sense of the world around them as they begin to understand specific concepts. Play opportunities are also set up to provide children with opportunities to apply newly acquired knowledge, demonstrating their skills and level of understanding.

In providing these active learning opportunities through play we understand the central position of play within the EYFS framework. This is essentially a play based curriculum and pedagogy as the provision of play opportunities underpins its delivery within settings.

5 . Assessment and Record Keeping

Ongoing assessment is an essential aspect of the effective running of the EYFS setting at Corrie Primary School. Regular, planned and focused assessments are made of children's learning and individual needs. A record of each child's progress in all areas of their learning is kept by retaining and recording their assessment data electronically.

The main EYFS assessment method is through practitioners' observations of children in different teaching and learning contexts, including both adult focused activities and child initiated play. Observations/activities take place on a daily basis (both formally and informally). Practitioners make time to carry out planned observations of individuals and groups of children regularly. They also make spontaneous observations in order to capture significant moments of children's learning (WOW moments). Observations are recorded on the 'Target Tracker' online system. All practitioners are involved in observing and completing tasks with them.

Practitioners use observations to support their developing knowledge of individual children. It informs them of children's abilities, needs, interests, play schemas and learning styles. Observations are evaluated, children's learning priorities are identified and relevant learning opportunities are planned to support children to make progress. Other methods of assessing children in the EYFS setting include engaging alongside children in their play, annotation of children's written work and talking with children about their task or play.

The Reception Baseline Assessment (RBA) is carried out during the children's first six weeks upon entering the setting. The RBA is a short, interactive and practical assessment of your child's early literacy, communication, language and mathematics skills when they begin school. It will be undertaken with your child's class teacher and will measure your child's progress from Reception to Year 6. The data from the assessment will only be used by the Department for Education when your child has reached the end of year 6, to provide the baseline to measure the progress of your child's year group from reception to year 6. Your child's class teacher will be able to spend quality 1-1 time with your child, getting to know them and if they need any further support in certain areas. When your child reaches year 6, you will be able to see the progress your child has made throughout their school journey.

At the end of the Reception year, the EYFS Profile is completed for each child to provide a summary of every child's development and learning achievements against the Early Learning Goals this indicates if the children are:

- ✓ Meeting expected levels of development
- ✓ Not yet reaching levels (emerging)

The results of the profile are shared with parents and/or carers.

6 . Planning

The EYFS framework provides a long term plan to follow by ensuring that all Early Learning Goals are covered throughout the academic year.

A long term plan for the curriculum is created with all early years' practitioners' involvement to ensure clear progression from Nursery to Reception to enable all children to build upon their knowledge and skills through a wide range of rich experiences. From this, medium term and short term planning is created to take into account the individual children's learning and developmental needs. Staff take into account the individual needs, interests, and stage of development of each child in their care, they use the information to plan challenging and enjoyable experiences. Staff note the children's interests and natural desire to learn and explore and make them a teachable moment adapting planning where necessary. Where a child is identified as having an additional need or disability, staff plan for their individual needs and ensure external agencies are contacted for support and advice.

All Areas of Learning and Development are planned for and available to access within the setting. The learning opportunities provided include a range of adult focused and child initiated activities indoors. The setting also makes use of the outdoor environment to enhance learning and the development of all children.

7 . Parents as Partners

At Corrie Primary School we recognise the importance of establishing positive relationships with parents, as highlighted by the EYFS framework. We understand that an effective partnership between school and home will have a positive impact on children's learning and development. So, practitioners endeavour to encourage the regular sharing of information about the children with parents.

We value the role of parents as children's primary educators. Through questionnaires and informal chats at the beginning and end of the day, practitioners encourage parents to share their unique knowledge of their child, providing further insight into the child as an individual (e.g. characteristics, interests, experiences, likes, dislikes). This supports practitioners in establishing interesting and stimulating learning experiences, responding to children's needs and interests.

Parents are kept informed of what is happening in the setting through regular newsletters, their class' web page, school social media, parent's evenings, coffee mornings, parent's information boards and informal chatting at the beginning and end of the day. This also gives suggestions of how parents can support their children's learning at home; consolidating and building on what has been covered in the setting. Learning within the setting is also shared with families through the use of the 'Target Tracker Link' facility. Target Tracker Link is a home-school website dedicated to providing a direct link between schools and parents for quicker, simpler communications about learning observations. Staff will share these observations with families frequently throughout each term. Whole school newsletters are also sent home on a half termly basis.

Parents evenings take place in the Autumn and Spring terms where practitioners give feedback on children's learning and development progress.

Other opportunities for practitioners to share children's learning, development and well-being with parents include end of year reports and celebration assemblies where children's achievements are recognised.

Parents are also invited to get involved with school life. There are opportunities for them to help with activities such as educational visits and reading, as well as offering their particular skills (e.g. cooking, art, music) to support children's learning. Parents may be invited into the setting on other occasions such as open mornings where Parents are invited to a range of practical workshops to support their children's learning at home. We run Phonics workshops, Maths workshops and Dough

Disco workshops. If circumstances prevent us from holding these events in person, these workshops will be held virtually online.

The setting has a friendly, open-door ethos and practitioners are available to talk to parents at the beginning and end of the day. Parents are always welcomed into school and encouraged to discuss any concerns they might have.

8. Admissions and Induction

In the EYFS at Corrie Primary and Nursery School we acknowledge the following key transitional stages: Home to Nursery, Nursery to Reception and Reception to Year 1.

We believe that best early years practice sees learning as a continuum and that our role is to smooth the way between each of these stages. At Corrie Primary School we are committed to the Early Years Foundation Stage and we believe it is essential for children who enter both Nursery and Reception to receive their entitlement to the EYFS curriculum throughout these years. We believe that through effective delivery of the EYFS curriculum and matching teaching and routines carefully to the developmental needs of children as they mature we ensure children are ready for the demands of the National Curriculum in Year 1.

Corrie Primary School has a full time Nursery, offering full and part time places and follows the EYFS curriculum. The school provides full-time Early Years education for children in the Reception Year. This is for children who enter school from September of the academic year in which they will turn five years old.

Nursery- Before children start in the setting, all children are given an opportunity to visit the setting before their start date. The purpose of these initial visits is for the children to meet their new practitioners and start to become familiar with the setting. Where appropriate Practitioners, with parental permission, will also go to visit the children in their current pre-school setting. The aim of these visits is to support practitioners to develop their knowledge and understanding of each child in order to make the transition period to Corrie Primary School as smooth as possible. 'All About Me' induction packs will also be given out to parents as another way to support practitioners' knowledge and understanding of each individual child.

Reception- In the summer term, parents are invited into school to meet the setting practitioners. At this meeting, information regarding the induction process and what goes on in the setting is shared. There is also time for informal chat and parents' questions. School information packs will be distributed to parents at this meeting, detailing school routines and expectations. Like when joining our Nursery, 'All About Me' induction packs will also be given out to parents as another way to support practitioners' knowledge and understanding of each individual child.

From September children attend the setting full-time, though parents can opt for their child to attend part time should they see fit. Every effort is made to make children feel safe, secure and happy. There is a relaxed and open ethos in the setting. Established routines, a calm atmosphere and encouraging talk are some of the strategies practitioners use to maintain children's positive feelings about school.
